Mother and the children went to Anderson more than a week ago to stay for a month and I went up on Saturday 25th and came back on the 27th and I brought the children back with me they were not at all contented with out me. Mother I do not no when she expects to return whether at all or not I am boarding at the boarding House or we are takeing meals there and sleeping at home Lillian is at work in the mill and Jessie is looking after the children I am going to try it for awhile as the children can not keep the house as they should. I tell you it is somthing else to be in the condition that I am I have thought of marrying again but you know that would no dought cause trouble as I certianly would not agree for any woman to mistreat the children. I hope that it will all work out for the best have you moved to Atlanta yet? You ought to write to mother oftener you can address her at Aiken home. let me hear from you often as I am always glad to get a letter from you. Why dont you come over some time and see us we would be glad to see you at any time. I am getting along as well as could be expected in the mill we dont have any too much help but do not have any thing to stand. Mary is a let better I hope she is going to get well. your brother.
