We thank you for your confidential printed information regarding organized labor in different parts of the South.

We thought you would be interested in seeing a circular, - which we herewith attach, - that is being sent to mills all over the South, by the strikers.

Possibly if you would refer to this in your next BULLETIN it might offset some of the damage that such a circular will do.

We are glad to say that our condition is improving regularly, although the incessant and unreasonable picketing is still active.

This morning we have 135 more looms running than we had last Monday morning.

Yesterday they had a parade. A total of 271 were in the parade, of which not over 30 were our employees. The balance were loafers, bums, and hangers-on, who are glad to get a living off of the commissary and the Union without having to work.

The interest you take in this matter should be followed up by every Southern textile paper.
