Report of Opr. #115

Saturday, June 20th, 1914.

Reported around Mills as picket at 6:30 A.M., remaining until noon. Nothing of interest to report in connection with this.

I went to Union meeting at 3:00 P.M. Meeting first addressed by Mrs. Conboy. She said Company was licked out of their boots, and nothing more was to be done, but wait. All her remarks on this line.

Followed by Mrs. Smith. Exactly same line of talk.

Miles followed. He told them strike was won. That they were all heroes. Eyes of whole country was on them in amazed admiration.

I note that all business of a financial nature is kept away from the meetings. They are simply told to keep on waiting, and they are sure to win, as organized labor all over the country is at their back.

I walked in parade next to Miles, Smith and Conboy.

I note that with one or two exceptions, no interest, except that of curiosity was shown by general public in Atlanta, along the entire line of march. This is in direct contradiction to statement of Organizers that they are being supported by public.

Number of strikers were greatly augmented by hangers on and friends of strikers.
