FULTON BAG & COTTON MILLS.

I reported at Union and found everybody talking about the finding of the dictograph in there last night, and there was so much excitement that the special meeting of last evening was postponed. Someone got Geo. P. Moore, #10 Albion St., the Real Estate man, who rented the house where dictograph was located, over the phone, and he said a man who rented the house where dictograph was located, was named A. E. Winyard. Miles got this address and went to see Chief Beavers about it. I was unable to learn results.

Mr. Fleming opened the meeting by giving some orders to pickets, and called on a Mr.----- a former overseer of the Bag Dept. of the Company, who was discharged, and said he was going to stick to the Union, and hoped they would win, and told the men they would win.

The next speaker was a Mr. Crooms of the A.F. of L., and he made a short address, nothing of any interest.

Mrs. Smith then took the floor, and said the Jews were sweating blood, and were worried, or they would not put a dictograph in there, and said "he had to hire a machine, as no man in his employ was dirty enough to tell him anything. Just what we wanted, and you will hear that most everybody is suspected of being spies, but don't pay any attention to them, as Company would try to cause any trouble they could. Things are coming our way. There are 14 being put out, and I got 5 houses waiting for you all, so let them put you out. I have to go to Elsas park now, to look after the moving.

Then came Mr. Lindsley, and said he knew how his Supt. found out that he was fighting for the Union, and said, "I told him I was fighting for Labor for 17 years, and will fight. The Southern Railway Company can do as they like about it; job or no job.

Mr. Watson of Local #43 of the Machinist Union was making a labor speech, when Mrs. Smith called me up on phone to come to village to help her, and I did help her up to 2:00 P.M.

Mrs. Smith moved 14 more families, and had trouble in getting wagons. She has 5 houses, one of Northwood St. and Bumel St. The use of two houses were offered her this A.M., and she is renting some. She says a rich man has offered her money to help the strike along, but did not mention any names. Mrs. Smith lives at #34 Angier Ave, Bell Phone Ivy 8085.
