

Friday, November 20th, 1914. Report of Opr. #457.

FULTON BAG & COTTON MILLS.

I reported for work at 6:30 A.M. to-day, and worked all day weaving.

Was up on Decatur Street to-night with Mr. Taylor, Wilbur Brown, John Anderson and Mr. Bagley. Mr. Bagley is the man who complained about the bosses not knowing ~~what they~~ wanted. He said the overseer wanted one thing and the ~~second~~ hand wanted another. I reported this in one of my reports of a week ago, but could not find out this man's name. I was introduced to him last night in the pool room. I met another man by the name of Henry Maher. I was talking with him about the strikers, and he said that he thought they would start something about Jan. 1st, 1915, because the contract of the Fulton Company expired with the railroad company, and the railroad men are going to refuse to touch any of the cars that the Fulton Company has on their siding, after Dec. 31st, 1914.
